300 Years in the New World

Most of the Palatinate Germans who were sent to the colonies as a result of Queen Anne's actions arrived here in 1710 and 1711. They were to later be known as the "Palatines" and would have a significant impact on the colonies and the new county that would be formed there.

The "Palatines to America" organization was formed for the purpose of researching and reporting the events and genealogy associated with the mass migration. The 2010 Palatines to America National Conference and Annual Meeting will be held June 18-19, 2010 in Fishkill, New York. The Old Stone Fort

Located in Schoharie, New York the Old Stone Fort was built in 1772 as a High Dutch Reformed Church and now serves as a museum honoring the area and those who made it significant.

Schoharie was a significant part of the lives of the Palatines, many of whom moved to the Schoharie Valley when they left the Pitch Camps. The area was also critical to the American Revolution by providing much need grain to feed to rebel army. This "bread basket" and the surrounding areas became essential to the establishment of the new country and its survival.

In addition to the fort itself a colonial period living museum has been constructed adjacent to the fort and cemetery. During our visit we will experience a tour intended to help us understand the impact palatine settlers had on the area, and the impact of the area on palatine settlers.

The Getman/Bierman family spent several years in the Schoharie Valley before the resettled in further reaches of the Mohawk Valley.

Web Page Updated in January

Over the past several months your association historian Wayne Getman has been researching descendants of Anna Maria Getman b. 1721. She is the first of the eight children born to Johann Frederick Getman and Maria Johanna Bierman.

Anna Maria married Johann Henrich Meyers and moved to German Flatts. Several of her descendants later moved to western Ontario, Canada. After nearly a year of research I estimate I have assembled approximately 1/3 of her descendents who were added to the web page data in early January. The data now includes nearly 20,000 descendants and in-laws.
