Mrs. Carrie Hatch whose records will be quoted frequently, Mrs. Estelle Folts Callan, Mr. Nellis Getman of Johnstown, N. Y. and Mr. Charles Getman of Buffalo, N. Y. all deserve credit for the data they preserved. But the foundation of this book is the research and compilation of the records of Mr. Byron Getman who was first Historian of the Getman Family for many years. When Mr. Bowman died, his widow gave all his papers on the Getman family to Union College. The Getman Family

N. Y. and other towns and villages. A genealogy of the family would show them to have entered in most every walk of life, farmers, merchants, lawyers and businessmen of all professions, thereby giving a good cross section of the history of the Mohawk valley.

A NEW PARTNER IN FIRE INSURANCE FIRM.

Broadalbin Herald, NY Thursday, January 2, 1908

Fred E. Billingham, of the fire insurance agency of Getman & Billingham, Gloversville, has disposed of his interest in the firm to Ivan H. Wright of No. 31 Kingsboro avenue, the change to

take place January-1. The firm who conduct offices at No. 24 North Main street, will be continued after that under the name of Getman & Wright The future plans of Mr. Billingham are undecided at present. Mr. Wright is the son of Attorney and Mrs. Horton D. Wright, and has been employed for several years as stenographer in his father's office. His many friends in this city will be pleased to note his rapid rise in the business world.

The fire insurance firm of Getman & Billingham is the oldest institution of its kind in Gloversville, having been founded by Henry Churchill nearly fifty years ago. Succeeding him was A. C. Churchill, who assumed control about 1860. Mr. Churchill took John L. Getman into, partnership with him in 1876, and the firm was known for four years under the name of Churchill and Getman. In 1881 Mr. Getman assumed entire charge of the business, and in 1896 Mr. Billingham, the present retiring member, became associated with him

John Lasher Getman (GFG – B 182) 1842 – 1923, Married Olive E Lake, 1849 – 1926. They had 7 children. Prior to his career in insurance John is listed as a collector for the Internal Revenue Service.

Mrs. Damon Getman Chosen Review of Activities

Mrs. Damon L. Getman was reelected president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Mary Imogene Bassett Hospital at its annual meeting held Monday afternoon. Other officers named included Mrs. John H. Powers, vice-president; Mrs. Sumner M. Shumway, secretary; Mrs. Theodore P. Feury, corresponding secretary and Mrs. Bernard D. Carr, treasurer. Mrs. John H. Schneider was elected to a two-year term on the Board of Trustees.

One of the most important functions of the Auxiliary is the operation of a Loan Closet, a free service to anyone needing to borrow hospital equipment for use in their own homes. Cochairmen of this committee are Mrs. Carmen A". Booan and Mrs. Peter Alotta, who reported that in its first year of operation, 75 persons had used its- equipment. Persons having need for equipment such as hospital beds, wheel chairs, walkers, bed pans, etc., may borrow it without charge for limited periods by calling either of the co-chairmen.

Mrs. Schneider, retiring chairman of the Auxiliary's newspaper cart project, reported that she and her volunteer workers had sold 20.429 newspapers, \$743 worth of magazines and \$170 worth of miscellaneous stationery during the past year.

Mrs. Getman announced that the organization would again assist in arrangements being made in connection with National Hospital Week, May 6-12.

Each of the Auxiliary members will soon be asked to do some particular job in connection with this project

The Auxiliary is now in its third year. It has over 50 active members, some 40 associate members, three life members, and over 60 volunteers who are working but who have not yet enrolled. Interest in the organization extends over a wide area, with volunteers coming from Cooperstown, Milford. Richfield Springs, Springfield Center, Fly Creek, Hartwick, and from the Red Creek Valley Grange. Women who may like to join, are asked to contact one of the officers.

The Auxiliary, which is an institutional member of the American Hospital Association, provides many different types of volunteer service for patients at the hospital. It operates the hospital reception desk, and also a newspaper and magazine cart. It also has a birthday bed fund which is used to give needed care to needy children

The Auxiliary conducts occupational therapy protects in the children's ward, and otherwise makes arrangements to see that hospitalized children are kept as happy as possible in strange surroundings. The Loan Closed, already discussed here, is one of the more important projects it operates.

The Auxiliary also helps in the administration of the hospital chaplain service, and also operates a gift counter at the hospital along with a gift cart. It also conducts fund-raising activities, proceeds from which are used to provide therapeutic accessories and develop its services.

EPHRATAH WOMAN TAKES HER LIFE WITH BUTCHER KNIFE

Amsterdam Evening Recorder, NY Wednesday, December 31, 1919

Fort Plain. Dec, 31. — Mrs. Albert N. Getman, aged 45 years, committed suicide at her home near Ephratah. Just north of this village, yesterday morning.

It cannot be learned that any family trouble was responsible for the deed. Mrs. Getman had not been in the best of health for a long time, and during the past week she had exhibited signs of mental disorders and is said to have threatened to take her life

In the later hours of Monday night, after the family had retired. Mr. Getman awakened to find his wife leaning over him with a razor in her hand. She made an attempt to cut him with the weapon, but he grabbed her and took it from her.

Yesterday morning he went to a neighbor's home to call Dr. G. L. Meyer, leaving his wife, her mother and his son at home. This was.at about 8:30 o'clock. A short time after he had left Mrs. Getman left the house for the purpose, she stated, of going to a small outbuilding. When she did not return in a reasonable length of time her mother went in search of her and found her lying in a pool of blood in the outbuilding in a lifeless condition.

The mother at-once called for help, and it was found upon examination that Mrs. Getman had

Used a butcher knife to commit the rash act and had cut her throat, severing the left carotid and trachea. Life was extinct when she was found.

Coroner Joslin of Johnstown was notified and he turned the case over to Dr. G. L. Meyer.

Mrs. Getman was held in high esteem by a large circle of friends, and all deeply regret her death. She was born in the town of Palatine and always lived in that section.

Besides her husband she is survived by her mother, Mrs. Adam Glennar, and one son, Carl Getman, all of Ephratah. The funeral will be held at the home Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock and at the Ephratah Methodist church at 2 o'clock, the Rev. Mr. Sumner officiating. The interment will be in the Ephratah cemetery.
