#### More Than An Obituary

Kendall County Record, Illinois March 9, 1910 Sent to us by Clyde J. Getman

Mr. Lewis Rickard, Senior, died at his home in Bristol, Tuesday morning, March 1, just seven weeks after the death of his wife, Caty. Mr. Rickard was born in Montgomery County, New York, January 10, 1820.

October 19, 1840 he was married to Caty Loucks and in 1841 came west, locating on the farm which has since been his home. There were four children born to this couple -- Arnold, who died in 1865 at the age of twenty-four from disease contracted while in the Union army; Lucinda, wife of Daniel Welch of Aurora; Lewis L. and Elmer G., both of Bristol.

Mr. and Mrs. Rickard may be classed with the first settlers of this community. When they first came to Illinois, they had about \$150 in cash and very few household goods. Deceased was obliged to haul all his product by wagon to Chicago, a trip then requiring three days. In his absence his wife attended to all the work at home, taking care of the stock and also going into the field to bind the grain by hand, a task that would cause our men of the present day to flinch. With such a wife it was, of course, impossible to do anything but succeed and by hard work together with their combined ambitions, they did succeed and also lived long, healthy lives. This couple reached their sixty-ninth wedding anniversary, October 19, 1909.

Mr. Rickard was plain speaking and straightforward, qualities which earned him the reputation of being an honest man and a good citizen respected by all who knew him. He was well read and after he became so infirm as to necessitate his leaving work alone he spent most of his time reading daily papers and magazines. In this way he kept in touch with the outside world and was able to converse intelligently on all current topics. Then a few years ago, his eyesight began to fail and in a short time he was unable to read. This loss made a great change in him. Up to that time he had been jolly and good natured, always ready to visit relatives and friends and enjoyed company. After his eyesight failed it was only on rare occasions that he could be induced to leave home, even to call on near relatives. However, at home, he remained the same good natured, fun loving man for some time. Then he became practically helpless, brought on by his age and a gradual wearing out. His wide circle of relatives and friends prefer to remember him as the jolly, ambitious man of some years

ago. For these qualities he will be long remembered by all who knew him.

The funeral services we held at the home Thursday afternoon, the sermon being preached by Rev. C. A. Bucks of Aurora. Misses Mame Pearce and Kate Butler sang appropriate selections. Interment was in Oak Grove Cemetery, Bristol. The pallbearers were George Wormley, Myron Wormley, Colvin Pearce, Joseph Grimwood, George Cowdry and Samuel Williams.

Sgt. Clifford Nellis returned to his home here Saturday night after receiving his discharge the night before at Fort Dix, N. J.

He had been overseas in India and China for the last 28 months. He was in service a total of 35 months.

Sergeant Nellis is entitled to wear two battle stars, the Asiatic Pacific ribbon and the unit citation, medal.

He was an air operations specialist overseas.

On January 1 he will resume his former employment as deputy county clerk in Fonda.

#### Now The Dark Side

Syracuse Journal, NY Monday, July 10, 1916

LITTLE FALLS, July 10.—Mrs. Winnie Getman lies in the hospital to-day struggling for life with a bullet wound in her left lung, inflicted by a 38-callber revolver fired by her husband, Ralph Getman of Ilion. Getman made a good escape and is still missing. Getman also made an attempt on the life of George Stark, the girl's uncle, but the shot went wide and shattered a window.

The shooting occurred Saturday evening at about 10:30 o'clock, at the Globe Hotel in John St., of which George Stark is the proprietor. Trouble has existed between the young couple for some time. Getman wanted his young wife to live in Ilion, where he is employed at the Remington Arms plant, and if she would not do this he wanted their infant babe. It will be recalled that a couple of weeks ago Getman was apprehended by the police for stealing the baby and taking it to Ilion. Since then Getman has been in this city and has been a constant disturber at the Stark house.

District Attorney W. Earl Ward was notified as was Coroner Hunt. The district attorney took charge of the case, while the officers made a thorough search of the lumber yards near Fifth St., which direction Getman ran after the shooting. Chief Long also arrived some time later and he joined in the search. Later District Attorney Ward

and Chief Long went to Ilion to the fellow's home. His mother answered the door and when asked where her son was she replied that she had not seen him since 8 o'clock, when he left the house.

Mrs. Getman was married to Ralph Parker Getman about 18 months ago. They resided at the Globe Hotel until some months ago, when they separated. She is 19 years of age. Her condition to-day is very critical and only faint hopes are held for her recovery. Dr. Douglas of Utica was called for consultation.

Getman is described as being five feet, seven or eight inches tall, weight 150, age about 23, stocky build, light complexion, blue eyes, light hair. He was hatless, wore blue suit with semi-pegged trousers and black shoes. Ho is a very good looking fellow.

## The Syracuse Herald, NY Monday, July 10, 1916

Little Falls. July 10.-Ordering his wife to kiss him for the last time, Ralph Getman of Ilion shot her at the Globe hotel here Saturday night and then escaped. Mrs. Gettman is in the Little Falls hospital with little hope held out for her recovery. A search throughout Central New York is being made for Getman.

The shooting came as the result of long trouble between the young couple who have been married but eighteen months. Saturday Getman went to Utica and found his wife at a dance. This aroused his -anger.

He asked her to return with him to Little Falls and she refused. He threatened her with a revolver and she consented to leave with him. On the car they quarreled. He told her that he was going to kill her.

Reaching- this city they left the car find he tried to force her to walk to a lonely spot on Fifth street. Her mother saw his actions and started after them. She persuaded them to come to her home at the Globe hotel.

At the hotel the quarrel was resumed. Getman told his wife that he was going to kill her and asked her to Kiss him for the last time. George Stark, the girl's father, entered the room and told Getman that Chief or Long was coming for him.

"I'll get you before he gets me." declared Getman, as he fired at Stark. The shot went wide. Getman turned to his wife and fired at her. The bullet struck her in the side and she sank in her chair, her infant baby falling in her lap.

The woman was rushed to the hospital and placed on the operating table. The bullet was traced through her left lung. Getman made good his escape.

#### WIFE MURDER TO AUBURN

Herkimer Man Pleads Guilty - Gets Twenty Years' Sentence

Herkimer, July 12, Ralph Getman, who six years ago fatally shot his wife at a Little Falls hotel, pleaded guilty yesterday to murder in the second degree.

Getman, only 26 years old, bore none of the prisoner aspect as he came into Supreme court before Justice I. R. Devendorf.

Attorney Frank A Schmidt, Getman's counsel, stated that after reviewing the case he found that the ends of justice should be served by a second degree charge. District Attorney Earl Ward, accepted, stating that it would be in accordance with justice in this case.

Getman pleaded guilty to second degree and Justice Devendorf and once read the statutory sentence of 20 years or the maximum of life imprisonment in Auburn prison.

Mr. Schmidt wiaved for two days that the prisoner might have time to gather up some personal effects here. The court agreed. Saturday Morning Getman will be taken to Auburn by Sheriff Firth.

Newspaper Article (The Syracuse Herald, NY, Monday, July 10, 1916)

### The Citizen-Advertiser, Auburn, NY Friday, December 22, 1933

Ralph Getman, 37, of Ilion, walked out of Auburn Prison a free man today after serving a little more than 11 years of a 20-year to life sentence for murder.

He was received at the prison July 12, 1922, from Herkimer County.

Getman was attired la a new suit of civilian clothing and given the customary \$20 bill upon his release. He also was given transportation money to some New York State city where he has been promised employment. The name of the city was not revealed.

Arthur D. English, 22, of Dundee, was released along with Getman. English was received November 11, 1927, from Tioga County to serve a 10-year term for automobile theft.

Both men received holiday commutations from Governor Lehman.
